



Contemplation

In catechesis, there is a primacy of the Creed

Contemplation, Catechesis, and the Liturgy

Communion is the goal of all Contemplation – Union in "gaze" of faith – cf. CCC 2713 Liturgy – Sacramental union Catechesis – Union in knowledge and love - God created us to know and love him- CCC - The intellect gives the will the object to love In the Liturgy, we 'see' with the eyes of faith



A Dominican Principle



"Preaching (teaching) is the fruit of contemplation."

They contemplate in order to be able to proclaim the fruit of their contemplation.

"Better to illuminate than merely to shine; to deliver to others contemplated truths than merely to contemplate."

The Roots

Catechists' spirituality should bear the marks of:

- 1. Weekly attendance of Mass and reception of the Most Holy Eucharist
- 2. Frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance
- 3. Personal prayer special devotion to Mary
- 4. Daily prayer for faith, hope, and love.
- 5. Daily prayer for students, parents, and all those involved in catechesis.
- 6. Continuous study of the Catholic Faith
